## President's Letter by Laurie Young

The end of the church year is approaching and summer services are on the horizon. But, there are still a lot of issues to be resolved and opportunities to celebrate this spring. The issues I am referring to include adopting a budget, changing a bylaw, and voting on whether or not to purchase a new building. This requires us to invest time in becoming informed, provide feedback, and participate in the decision-making process.

The Annual Meeting is scheduled for May 17th. You will receive a formal notice of the meeting with an agenda and attachments. Some very important decisions are on the agenda, including the budget for 2017-2018. The proposed budget has been developed to reflect our values, goals and priorities. Thanks to all who participated in its development and to those who attended the budget meeting.

A change to the bylaw addressing the number of trustees on the Board is also on the Annual Meeting agenda. The proposed change will reduce the size of the Board from 9 to 7. The primary advantage of this change is that it will free up people to do other work to achieve our vision. Our bylaws are extremely important. They provide the framework for how we function. They govern day to day functions and also address infrequent situations such as calling a minister and purchasing real estate. They reflect our vision and values.

In addition to business, the annual meeting is also a time to reflect on and celebrate the accomplishments of the past year. It's important to step back from the day to day work we're involved in and appreciate all that this congregation and Reverend Laura have accomplished.

This has been a year of celebration – celebration of the 50th anniversary of MSUS. Another opportunity to celebrate the 50th Anniversary is the luncheon scheduled for June 11th after Sunday service. Celebrating the 50th anniversary this year in a variety of ways has made me appreciate the history of MSUS. Thanks to Barb Hughes for her work on 50th anniversary activities.

Another Congregational Meeting is scheduled on June 4th to vote on whether or not to purchase the new church on Ibis Street in Coon Rapids. Many have participated in the information meetings and have raised important questions and identified benefits of this opportunity. An open house has been scheduled on May 6th to tour the building. We need the collective wisdom of all in order to make the best decision for this community. Thanks to Michele Wallace and the Ad Hoc Building Work Group for their work.

Mark your calendars with all these dates and thanks for your commitment to this community.

# Minister's Message by Rev. Laura Smidzik

## May's Worship Theme is Embodiment

### The Low Road By Marge Piercy

What can they do to you? Whatever they want. They can set you up, they can bust you, they can break your fingers, they can burn your brain with electricity, blur you with drugs till you can't walk, can't remember, they can take your child, wall up your lover. They can do anything you can't blame them from doing. How can you stop them? Alone, you can fight, you can refuse, you can take what revenge you can but they roll over you.

But two people fighting back to back can cut through a mob, a snake-dancing file can break a cordon, an army can meet an army.

Two people can keep each other sane, can give support, conviction, love, massage, hope, sex. Three people are a delegation, a committee, a wedge. With four you can play bridge and start an organization. With six you can rent a whole house, eat pie for dinner with no seconds, and hold a fund raising party. A dozen make a demonstration. A hundred fill a hall. A thousand have solidarity and your own newsletter; ten thousand, power and your own paper; a hundred thousand, your own media; ten million, your own country.

It goes on one at a time, it starts when you care to act, it starts when you do it again after they said no, it starts when you say "We" and know who you mean, and each day you mean one more.

Marge Piercy's poem, *The Low Road* speaks to the power of numbers, the strength of a collective, and the gifts of community. I've heard this poem read in worship at several different Unitarian Universalist churches. It always makes me smile and sparks a sense of greater potential than I usually imagine. The build up from being alone, to a pair of people, to a whole country incites energy in me. However, it is the final sentence that taps into the center of my Unitarian Universalist faith and ministry: *It goes on one at a time, it starts when you care to act, it starts when you do it again after they said no, it starts when you say "We" and know who you mean, and each day you mean one more.*

Some of you may be uncomfortable with the words "faith" and "ministry" while others are inspired by such terminology. I use those words deliberately because I believe that what happens in a church is different than what happens in organizations outside of a faith tradition. We are connected by common principles and sources and speak of a covenantal faith which calls us into a relationship with one another grounded in care, commitment, and courage. I use the word "ministry" as representing service which is grounded in something greater. For me, shared ministry lifts up the contributions of all of us as we aspire to create a world where we as individuals and as community ground ourselves in love and work for a vision of a more just and equitable world.

The theme for May is embodiment. What does it look like when we embody saying "we" and each day mean one more? By the end of this year we will have welcomed nine new members to the congregation and several devoted new "friends." I have seen this church welcome them with open arms and glad hearts. When I speak of growth at MSUS this slow and steady influx of joyful and inquisitive seekers is what I imagine. I believe our faith calls us to grow and share that which gives us hope and meaning. This is how we will move into the future with old-timers and new comers side by side in the pews, in small groups, in song, and out in the world. May it be so.

## Building Discussion Moves Forward

As you have hopefully heard, there are ongoing congregational discussions about the possibility of purchasing the former Salvation Army church located at **10347 Ibis Street NW** in Coon Rapids.

MSUS committed to growth in membership over a decade ago, and has explored and implemented many things to try to make it happen. Unfortunately, those efforts have not resulted in growth. A look at the past twenty plus years shows our membership as bouncing around one hundred, or, basically flat. A growing consensus is that our current physical space is limiting our ability to grow. We are probably unable to expand on our current lot due to various restrictions, and spent nearly an entire church year considering, and ultimately decisively voting against, purchase of the adjacent home and lot to our south. A Growth Task Force was convened to examine our options, and issued their report in January of 2014. One of their recommendations was that our best option for growth in membership was to purchase another church and move.

An Ad Hoc group of various members has been looking into all types of alternative spaces for consideration for about twelve years. Approximately fifty spaces (not just churches) have been considered over that time period, and, relatively quickly, were rejected as unsuitable. The Coon Rapids space appears as though it could work for us. After making that determination, the group took the issue to the Board, and at their March 28, 2017 meeting, the Board unanimously approved our plan for engaging the congregation in discussion about this opportunity.

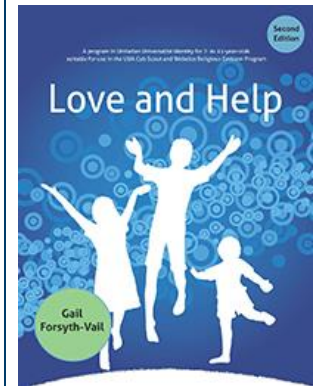
Four informal discussions and opportunities to ask questions have been held, and on April 18, the group made a more formal presentation, with discussion following, facilitated by the Rev. Phil Lund, staff member for congregational life from the MidAmerica Region of the Unitarian Universalist Association. One more formal presentation and opportunity for discussion is planned for April 23. At the time this article went to press, forty three members and friends have attended one or more session. From these discussions, it appears that people are giving this issue careful consideration. While there is understandable anxiety around this possibility, there is also excitement about what this could mean for our church and our broader faith. We hope many more got the chance to attend April 23, and that lots of folks will be there for the May 6 open house and discussion from 1 – 3 at the Coon Rapids church!

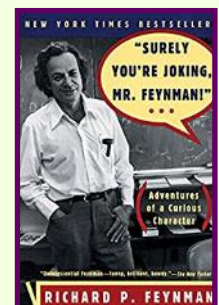


## Sunday Night Book Club

History will remember Nobel Prize-winning physicist Feynman (1918–1988), for his work in quantum physics and his role in the investigation of the explosion of the Challenger space shuttle. Contemporary readers and listeners, however, will remember him best for his reputation as a free-thinking iconoclast whose personal adventures were hilarious, insightful and inspiring. A series of anecdotes shouldn't by rights add up to an autobiography, but that's just one of the many pieces of received wisdom that Feynman cheerfully ignores in his engagingly eccentric book, a bestseller ever since its initial publication in 1985.
